This will bring Noble House to capacity, and we will work closely with the Nepalese child welfare authorities and with our colleagues at the Siddhi Memorial Hospital over the next few months to identify children in need of our support.

There have been a number of milestones for our older children this year, including graduations and a move to full time employment (details are included in the following pages). We are so proud of what these kids have achieved, of their mature and joyful approach to life, and of their ongoing commitment to their younger siblings at Noble House.


Of course, none of this would be possible without the enduring and huge generosity of our supporters. This year has seen a redoubling of

Hari recently stepped back from Siddhi due to ill health, and is now recovering. We wish him all the best.

This year saw Siddhi celebrate 25 years since it was established. We heartily congratulate Mr Shyam Dhoubadel and his wife Mrs Ranjana Dhoubadel as well as the whole Siddhi Memorial Foundation community on this important milestone.

Unfortunately, in August 2018 the Siddhi Memorial Hospital experienced severe flash flooding. While thankfully no lives were lost, there was extensive damage to the hospital premises and equipment. Siddhi has bounced back, but it hasn't been an easy journey. Siddhi is an extremely important institution to the people of Bhaktapur, and we look forward to continuing to work with Siddhi in the coming years.
