We are very proud of Sita Nepali, who recently passed the entrance exam for a three-year diploma to become a qualified medical laboratory technician. Sita comes from a minority caste in a small village in the remote Humla region of western Nepal (where the literacy rate is less than 50 per cent), and her enrolment in tertiary studies is considered very significant by her extended family.

Sita will live with her older brother and his family in Kathmandu while she undertakes her studies, supported through the Meg's Children pay-back scholarship program.

An earthquake hits western Nepal

In early November a significant earthquake in the Jajarkot District of western Nepal killed more than 150 people and brought destruction and suffering to many more. The earthquake was widely felt in western Nepal, including the remote Humla District, where Reema (pictured - with a baby she has just helped to safely deliver!) is working as a nurse in a government hospital. After an anxious wait we were so grateful to hear that Reema, who was one of our original children and grew up at Meg's, was safe and sound.

We're very proud of Reema's achievements and the person she has grown into. It's wonderful to see her set on a path to a



rewarding career. No doubt Reema's nursing skills are being put to great use as the Humla Region rebuilds. With cold weather now setting in, the suffering of those who lost homes and livelihoods during the earthquake is heightened, and our thoughts are with those communities.



**In October the people of Nepal (and many people around the world) celebrated Dashain, considered the biggest festival in the country and marked by a 15-day public holiday! During Dashain people often travel long distances to celebrate with family and friends, and several of the children from Noble House went to visit their relatives during the festival. It's important that the children are supported to build connections with their relatives and home communities, particularly to help them establish a network once they finish school.
